Letter from the Editor

Have you ever had anyone ask you how it feels to be something, such as: How does it feel to be 21? Or half a century? How does it feel to be the guest speaker? How does it feel to be a mom?

I was thinking about that the night of installation. No one had asked me how it felt to be president, but I had an experience that left me answering that very question.

REBUILDING SHATTERED LIVES WITH SOROPTIMIST DONATIONS

Last week Soroptimist had a wonderful opportunity to finish some spring cleaning in our Medical Loan Closet and donate medical supplies/equipment to Clear Path International. Clear Path International was founded in 2000 and has provided assistance to nearly 4,000 landmine accident survivors in Vietnam, Cambodia and along the Thai-Burma border. The next shipment to Cambodia has life saving supplies for the hospitals and equipment to improve care provided in local clinics. It's a wonderful effort to recycle a small portion of the \$200 million in medical goods that are declared "surplus" by the industry each year. Dr. and Mrs Hoffner have also been extremely generous by collecting supplies and medical equipment in Port Angeles. Just prior to their 50th anniversary celebrations with family and friends, they brought a van full of donations for the next Clear Path International shipment. What a heartwarming way to extend yourselves for the lifeline of others!

Clear Path International has sent over 64 containers to 25 mostly mine-affected countries. Last month, the container was sent to El Salvador; it brings hope and medical care when resources are extremely limited. This summer, a veteran endurance cyclist and amputee (Daniel Sheret) is riding around the world to raise funds and awareness for Clear Path International. I was shocked to learn that approximately every thirty minutes, someone- somewhere in the world is injured or killed by landmine debris. Lives, hopes and dreams are also shattered. You are invited to follow Dan's progress by listening to his podcast on www.abilitytrek.org. He wrote that his goal is "twofold – bringing hope to amputees in need throughout the world and shedding light on the great work being done for landmine victims". He will certainly **awaken that dream** for those in need of his help and quest to improve the quality of medical care for landmine victims.
